An Act to regulate the Number of Persons required to form a Coroner's Jury in Vancouver Island and its Dependencies.

[21st August, 1866.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to regulate the Number of Persons required to form a Coroner's Jury in the Co'onry of Vancouver Island and its Dependencies: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of the said Colony, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly thereof, as follows:

I. Whenever it shall be necessary for any Coroner to hold an Inquisition such Coroner shall empannel a Jury of not less than Six for the Purposes of such Inquisition and such Jury shall have the same Powers and perform the same Duties as a Coroner's Jury of Twelve or more and the Verdict of any such Jury of not less than Six, shall be to all Intents and Purposes as effectual as if found by a Jury consisting of Twelve or more.

Verdict of Jury of Six, as effectual as if found by Twelve.

II. This Act may be cited as "The Coroner's Jury Act, 1866."
