



CHAPTER 62.

An Act for the Protection of Breeders of Live Stock.

[21st June, 1902.]

HIS MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the “Live Stock Breeders’ Protection Act, 1902.” Short title.

2. In this Act, “live stock” shall mean and include any horse, mare, bull or cow. Interpretation.

3. Any owner of live stock may, upon filing with the Deputy Minister of Agriculture a statutory declaration of the breeding of any such live stock, register same in the Department of Agriculture and procure a printed copy of such breeding, with such form of certificate thereof as may be prescribed by the said Deputy Minister, upon payment of a fee of fifty cents therefor. Registration of certificate of breeding.

4. Every bill or poster issued by the owner of any such male live stock, or used by him for advertising the services of same, shall contain a copy of such certificate, otherwise such owner shall not be entitled to collect any fees for the services of such male live stock. Publication of certificate necessary to enable owner to collect fees.

5. Any owner misrepresenting the breeding of any live stock used or sold for breeding purposes shall be liable for the sum of one hundred dollars, which sum may be recovered by the purchaser thereof in case of sale, or the owner of any other live stock upon which service is Penalty for misrepresenting breeding.

performed by a male of the owner so misrepresenting, as the case may be; and the right to recover the said sum shall be deemed to be in addition to all other rights or remedies the purchaser or owner as aforesaid would or might have if this Act had not been passed.
