



CHAPTER 73.

An Act to authorize Herschel Roads Harrison to
practise Law.

[Assented to 29th March, 1934.]

WHEREAS a petition has been presented by Herschel Roads Harrison, of the City of Victoria, in the Province of British Columbia, praying to be authorized to practise law: Preamble.

And whereas it appears that the petitioner in the year 1914 enrolled with the Law Society of British Columbia as a student-at-law and articulated clerk of the Five-year Class, and pursued his studies as such until 1918, when he removed to a foreign State:

And whereas it appears that the petitioner subsequently in the year 1921 was called to the Bar and admitted to the Roll of Attorneys-at-Law in the State of California, one of the United States of America, and practised in said State for over four years, and was in good standing at the Bar in the said State at the time of his return to British Columbia in the year 1926:

And whereas it appears that the petitioner has satisfied the Benchers of the Law Society that he is educationally and by experience qualified to be called as a barrister and admitted to practise as a solicitor in the Province:

And whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the petition:

Therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:—

1. That upon Herschel Roads Harrison, a resident of Victoria, producing evidence to the secretary of the Law Society of British Columbia that he is a British subject, and upon payment of a fee of two hundred dollars to the Law Society of British Columbia, he shall, notwithstanding the provisions of the "Legal Professions

Act," be forthwith called as a barrister and admitted to practise as a solicitor in the Supreme Court of British Columbia, and be enrolled accordingly; and thereupon he shall be deemed to be duly called as a barrister and admitted as a solicitor pursuant to the provisions of said Act.
