

CHAPTER 84.

An Act to readjust the Boundary between the District of Burnaby and the Township of Richmond.

[4th March, 1914.]

WHEREAS it has been considered advisable to readjust the Preamble. boundary between the District of Burnaby and the Township of Richmond:

And whereas a petition has been presented by the two municipalities asking that the said boundary-line be as hereinafter set out:

And whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the petition: Therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:—

- 1. This Act may be cited as the "Burnaby-Richmond Readjust- short title, ment Act, 1914."
- 2. The boundary-line between the District of Burnaby and the Boundary fixed. Township of Richmond shall be and hereafter be deemed to be as follows: Commencing at a point where the boundary-line between the District of Burnaby and the District of South Vancouver produced southerly would intersect the centre line of the main channel of navigation of the North Arm of the Fraser River; thence easterly along the said centre line of the main channel of navigation of the North Arm of the Fraser River to the point where the said centre line intersects the boundary-line between the City of New Westminster and the said Township of Richmond.
- 3. All islands in the said North Arm of the Fraser River shall be Islands. and be deemed to have always been within the said Township of Richmond, anything in section 2 to the contrary notwithstanding, and shall be on the Richmond side of the said boundary-line defined in section 2 hereof.

Amount Burnaby to pay to Richmond.

4. The Corporation of the District of Burnaby shall pay to the Corporation of the Township of Richmond the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) without interest, as follows: Three thousand dollars (\$3,000) forthwith after the passing of this Act, and four thousand dollars (\$4,000) on or about the thirty-first day of December, 1914.
